Message from Church Council

When I was first approached about considering the role of Chair of Church Council I took time to reflect, meditate and pray before responding. I can honestly say the Spirit intervened and it became clear to me I was being called to serve.

I want to sincerely thank Rev. Maya Landell and all members of Church Council – particularly Carole Bennett, Past Chair – for giving of their time and skills over the past year. I also want to extend my gratitude to the many committee leads, staff and members and friends of our congregation who have shown support and patience as we returned to our in-person faith family following the COVID-19 pandemic.

In 2022/23 we continued to reach out into the community with upgraded technology, improved communication, and broadened online services and events. We got to know more people and groups in the surrounding neighbourhood and invited them to join our worship and programs. Post-pandemic, committees and teams slowly began to return to in-person work, although Zoom continued to be a welcome friend on several occasions. And through it all, the Spirit never ceased to fuel us with new energy, ideas and commitment to grow our faith community while we also listened to discern God's plan for us.

Here are a few highlights:

- New paint and upgrades of the Sanctuary, main floor hallways, and Church Office to improve ambiance and enhance safety
- A growing volunteer team to tend the Giving Garden, thus helping to feed more people (including many children) in our neighbourhood
- Equinox and solstice meditation sessions in the Sanctuary to quiet our minds and to pause, mark and prepare for new seasons
- The launch of the first Walk the Walk for Social Justice initiative, to help meet the many and diverse needs of those struggling in our community
- An Advent Retreat to prepare our hearts and minds for coming close to the mystery of Christmas
- A Light Up the Night Community service to celebrate the peace, joy, love and hope of the season to come

- A Blue Christmas worship service to offer comfort during a season of mixed emotions and recalling the loss of loved ones during Advent
- An Out of the Cold evening to offer food and warmth and companionship for those experiencing homelessness
- The delivery of two Community Roundtable events to show our leadership in ministry and presence in the community
- A Week of Guided Prayer experience of prayer companionship, shared scripture reading, and growth of a personal relationship with God
- A Summer Music Camp for children in the community to learn to play an instrument, sing in a choir and build relationships with new friends
- The outside installation of a rainbow Pride Bench as a public, intentional, and explicit statement of our commitment to providing a safe space of inclusivity

These are just a few of the ways we serve God in our faith community and beyond. They are expressions of “love in action” as together we try our best to follow in the ways of Jesus. I look forward to continuing to serve with you into the next year.

2023 Highlights

Staff Updates

In 2022/23, we said goodbye to Operations Staff members Leslee Armstrong and Lorraine Fait. We also welcomed new staff team members: Erin Pellow, Finance and Facilities Coordinator; Brianna Raakman, Children, Youth and Young Adult Ministry Lead; and Scott Robertson, Ministry Support Coordinator.

Music

Summer Music Camp hosted 46 children and youth for two full weeks in August. The Senior and Junior Choirs continued to grow in numbers, and our four staff singer soloists enjoyed a busy and successful year. Concerts, Light Up the Night community event, and five Christmas Eve services were all well attended.

Online Outreach

In 2023, the Communications Ministry saw great results. Facebook page “likes” increased 15%; Instagram page reach increased 1.8k%, a mix of organic and paid posts. Our YouTube channel clocked more than 29,000 views, and our YouTube subscribers increased by 91 people, reaching viewers in 13 countries.

Sanctuary Project

The Facilities Team worked to update several spaces within the building: installation of a new technology ‘light beam’ for the fire and smoke alarm, energy efficient ceiling lighting, and light filtering blinds over the Sanctuary south facing upper windows, and painting in the Sanctuary, Narthex and corridors.

Social Justice

The Poverty Awareness and Anti-Racism Working Groups expanded. The Mabelle Food Program served 85% more clients than the previous year. The Affirm Team held its second Pride BBQ and Celebration and unveiled the Pride bench. The Right Relations Circle began research for an Indigenous Peoples mural.



Message from the Board of Trustees

On behalf of the United Church of Canada, the Board of Trustees is responsible for overseeing our financial investments and holding the church property in trust. We are offering leadership on the the current Property Working Group comprising Paul Summers (Chair), Carole Bennett, John Handiak, Laurie Lyle and Jill Stewart. This group has had numerous meetings with the Rockport Group that is developing land to our south. The working group is also keeping abreast of all other local development and fostering relationships.

In 2023, the Board undertook a formal review of its external financial advisor and selected Fiera Capital to manage our investment portfolio as of June 1, 2023. Fiera manages approximately \$150 billion of client money and is also the financial advisor to the United Church Foundation and the United Church of Canada's investment portfolio.

Also in 2023, trustees took a leadership role when Islington United Church was invited by Windermere United Church to consider an amalgamation. A proposal was put forth by Islington United in March 2023. The congregation of Windermere United reviewed two proposals and elected to join with Runnymede United, a neighbouring church.

In fiscal year 2022/23, following many years of dedicated service, Ted Wilson stepped down as a member of the Board of Trustees. We are grateful for his years of counsel and will miss his presence.


